Having said I wouldn't do another one, I decided to try the free pattern from Rebecca Bryan's Modern Triangles website. Her designs are wonderful and so colourful. It uses a slightly different technique than the one we used at the workshop. Let's just say that it's done!

The Carol Doak method uses more fabric but you don't end up with reversed patterns and missed spaces.



## **OUR FIRST YEARS IN REVIEW**

**1977/78 (23 members)** Originally the Halton County Quilters' Guild, we were renamed the **Halton Quilters' Guild** at the second meeting! (*I'm now on the lookout for when the apostrophe was officially dropped!*) The membership fee was \$5.00 and name tags cost 10 cents each.

The guild set up their large quilting frame at John Wilson School and chose 3 quilt projects - Trillium, Tudor Rose and Nine Patch. The Trillium quilt was an original design by **Rosemary Makhan**, President and founding member of our guild. It won honourable mention in the CNE Centennial Quilt Competition.



Our first bus trip was arranged to Elmira.

A buffet supper was catered for the June meeting at a cost of \$2.75 per person.

**1978/79 (43 members)** Our first newsletter (nameless) was sent out in August. Typed and without photos, it was full of information on classes, quilt shops and guild info.

A second bus trip to Elmira was arranged at a cost of \$12 per person.

We joined the Oakville Arts Council and had our first Quilt Show (April) at the Granary in Oakville.

**1979/80 (53 members)** It was decided to keep a Quilt Register (photos and relevant information) of all members' quilts. (*Hmmm. Do we still have the register in one of the boxes? How long did this last? Can you imagine doing that now!*)

Plans were made for a Quilt Show in April at the Oakville Arts Council Spring Festival.. Another trip to Elmira was planned for April at a cost of \$15 with lunch included.

**1980/81 (50 members)** Meetings were moved to the Red Cross Building (Navy Street). Due to poor quality lighting, the Quilt Register no longer included photos! A bus trip to Violet Hill was planned.

**Maureen Barber** submitted the winning design in a competition for the guild logo. Our HQG banner was unveiled at April's Quilt Show which was held at Trafalgar Hall (with a \$1 admission fee to cover the \$200 hall rental cost). (*Trafalgar Township Hall was on the southeast corner of Dundas and Trafalgar aka Seventh Line. Not any more!*).



**1981/82 (64 members)** The membership fee was increased to \$10. Members were asked to now sign in upon arrival at guild meetings.

Our guild became an affiliate member of the Ontario Crafts Council and joined Quilt Toronto '81 (new - later became Quilt Canada). The Canadian Quilters Association was formed at Quilt Toronto '81. Members enjoyed a bus trip to Niagara--the-Lake, held a successful Quilt Show in May at the Trafalgar Hall, and organized several Quilting Bees throughout the guild year. (*Now we have Sew Days!*)

There is a rich collection of information on speakers and workshops in these binders, and we've only just started these monthly columns! I must share one workshop title that made me laugh out loud - "Does your Rolls Royce quilt top become a Pinto when quilted?" Marjorie Puckett (1982)

**Future Project?** Create scrapbooks of photos and newspaper items for easy sharing with members.

## Workshops Katherine Hunter

WOW! We had a full house on March 23rd for the paper-piecing workshop led by our own **Annette Guenther**. Almost everyone completed their block. I expect Sew and Share at April's meeting will likely showcase these diverse and wonderful colour variations created by participants.

April 29 (Saturday) - Hand Applique with Valerie Prosser

May 12 (Friday) - Quilt-As-You Go Workshop with Sue Paquette Sue will lead us through the steps to make a table runner with the "quilt-as-you-go" method. A few spots still remain.

The **Christmas Ornament** workshop with **Sue Curran** will take place in **July**, not June as previously indicated. Please continue to watch this space for information on a new workshop in June.


# **Halton Hearts V**

155 hearts were recently donated to MacMaster NICU. More kits will be available at the April meeting.

With several members new to the guild, it seems a good time to recall how our guild's participation in this project began. In 2018 **Annette Guenther** learned that McMaster's NICU was interested in **Inspirational Hearts** whereby flannel hearts  $\heartsuit$  are given to Moms and Dads with newborns in the NICU. The heart is worn against their skin so that the fabric absorbs the scent of the parents. The hearts are placed in the incubator/crib so that the scent is always with their baby. Research shows that this calms the baby. When released from hospital, the babies and their families take these hearts home with them! Thanks again, Annette, for introducing our guild to this worthy endeavor.

# Quilting is ....

# a "connecting thread" to new people one meets in a totally unexpected way!

And one thread leads to another ...

Our hostess Jane said that her daughter-in-law's mother, Janet Reader Day, also quilted and brought out her prized possession, a quilt made from a photo taken of Jane pushing Alida, her granddaughter on a swing. The quilt had won 1st place in the 2021

TrendTex Challenge, and Jane was pleased she was able to win the bidding on it!




#### **Even When I Push You Away, You Always Come Back**

Artist Statement: Friends stick with you through "thick and thin", through the good times and the bad, even when you push them away, they just won't abandon you. In my mind a swing set symbolically depicted this trait beautifully.

<u>Techniques</u>: raw edge applique; yarn and thread embellishment; binding with faux piping; a top layer of tulle restrains the raw edges from fraying

But the story doesn't end here. At the October meeting guilt appraiser and HQG member **Judy Lyons** was our speaker and shared many TrendTex Challenge pieces she had acquired. Among them was Janet's Canadian Firsts which had won the 2017 Viewers' Choice. Judy chose to buy this piece as "This art quilt touched on a lot of symbolism in Canadian history."

Artist Statement (in part): This quilt highlights some of Canada's natural resources, our love for winter sports, a railway 'Stitching' Canada together. Techniques: fusible appliqué, crayon, and thread embellishment



Judy is currently working on her upcoming book "which will feature quilt history lost -but not forgotten - during the centennial years."

Janet is past President and now Quilt Show Chair for the Prince Edward County Quilters' Guild.

#### An Interview with Janet Reader Day

I was so fascinated by how all this came together that I decided I would like to learn more about Janet and her quilting journey, so I asked some questions!

#### How did you get started quilting? Who taught you?

Introduced to the basics in 2005, I can't say I was "bitten by the quilting bug" until I attended a quilt show. I instantly knew I needed to join the guild to learn how they made such a variety of amazing quilts.

#### What is it about quilting that you like?

I love creating something useful, beautiful, and lasting. I enjoy <u>almost</u> every aspect of making a quilt, from planning the design, choosing fabric, to top stitching it together. However, I tend to veer off with a rotary cutter (yikes), and I find the piecing part very tedious. Top stitching is my favourite aspect of the whole process, followed closely by basking in that wonderful feeling of accomplishment received upon completion of each project! It is simply a joy to turn my ideas into reality.

#### What is your favourite type of quilt to make? Why?

My favourite is a portrait quilt. Each portrait involves all the parts of quilting that I enjoy most and is much faster to complete than making a bed sized quilt. A faster project brings a "happy completion high" only weeks after starting, as opposed to months later. (I'm very slow and methodical.)

#### Do you have an "I can't believe I did that" story related to your quilts?

It seems I always have to learn "the hard way". My impatience to start and complete a project has caused me to use some unorthodox methods and tools, skipping tried and true methods. I once used cereal box cut-outs pinned to a bed sized quilt sandwich, then tried to stitch a curved design around them with a walking foot. This was before I had a stencils, marking tools and a machine capable of free motion quilting. Needless to say, picking cardboard chunks out of a row of stitching wasn't fun!

#### Do you have a funny quilting anecdote to share?

The third quilt I made was a 'quilt as you go' one. Before I could join the sandwiched blocks together, I needed to trim them all down to the same size. So I sent my husband to the hardware store to have a piece of Plexiglas cut to the size I needed. Who knew that hardware store cut Plexiglass isn't perfectly straight and square? Lesson learned (again), to wait until you own the proper tools!







#### **Block of the Month**

Janet Fisher and Sheila Keating

MAY - April Showers bring MAY FLOWERS

... a faux square in a square with a twist!


#### You will need:


The unfinished block will be 12 1/2 inches.

- 2 6" squares of complimentary background fabric
- 1 7 1/2" focal floral fabric
- 1 10" outer fabric


#### **Directions:**

- 1. Place the 2 6" squares with right sides together
- Sew a ¼" seam around the outer edge
- 3. Mark an X on one of the 6" squares
- 4. Separate the 2 squares, make a small clip on the X line or insert a seam ripper in the centre of X, making sure not to go through both fabrics, cut a couple of threads.
- 5. Insert sharp pointed scissors, cut along lines of X to the corner stitch line but do NOT cut through
- 6. Press the cut triangles out to form the 1st new block
- 7. Square up to 7 ½" positioning the ruler equal distance between points on the side of the block.
- 8. Place the 7 ½" focal square right sides together with the focal fabric on bottom to ensure the seams on top block don't get flipped. Sew ¼" seam around outside.
- Mark an X on the first block not on the focal fabric.
- Repeat from #4 to #6 This will form the 2nd new block.
- Place the 10" outer block with right sides facing on the bottom of the 2nd new block and sew ¼"
  around the outer edge.
- 12. Mark an X on the 10" outer square and cut and press.

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




