Sue will have some items available for sale at a 10% discount to members in attendance (cash, debit or credit).



Knots and Patches

"Quilters affect eternity; they can never tell where their influence stops. They connect the past with the present and the future." Source unknown.

It has been a wild start to a new school year in the Hunter Clan. New programmes, new schools, and timetables all over the place! Ferrying children here and there has given me a lot of time to think about the place of quilts in our lives and how differently each of us approaches the art.

I have my favourite patterns when I need to quickly assemble a flimsy. I have NOT my favourite patterns and techniques, with red/white quilts and applique up at the top of the list! I also have 'signature' ways of constructing my quilts – cornerstones, cobblestones, piano key borders, and striped bindings to name most.

We are all in different places in our quilting journey and quilt for many different reasons. Quilts tell about connections, community and family. Quilts are our creative expression for good times and sad. We bring our life experiences to our quilting which makes each one different and unique even if the same pattern and material are used. As we sew, our quilts are imbued with our thoughts and cares. For me personally, time in my sewing room is as important and necessary as reading! I call it my quilt therapy. Even when I am stitching squares together or long strips, the thinking time is precious and many problems and conundrums are worked out in that time. However, it is probably misguiding to say that "Quilting is cheap therapy"!!

I am always looking for new ways to use up scraps. I came across this quilt in the July 2020 newsletter of the Dixie Quilt Guild. I believe it is called **Pick up Sticks**. Upon googling the name, hoping to find credit for the pattern, I came across many quilts called Pick up Sticks. As with other quilt blocks, there are often several different names attached to quilt patterns and ideas. One person's "Pick Up Sticks" may be another's "September Madness".

Have a wonderful month. Thanksgiving and Hallowe'en are two favourite times in our family and the children (5 to 47) are planning, planning, planning. Hopefully the weather will be wonderful, and you will find joy and comfort in your quilting journey. Supplies needed: 100' rope - supplied by facilitator The cost for the supplies is \$10.00.

Neutral thread with 2 matching bobbins plus other colours of thread

Scraps of fabric - small pieces, strips, and some larger pieces (If you may wish to theme your bowl (Christmas, Hallowe'en), bring thread and fabric to go with this theme.)

Sharp machine needles 90/14; Scotch tape

Sewing machine - It is essential that your machine is able to do a zig zag stitch.

A Return to Childhood Challenge

Make a quilt, throw size or smaller, using only three colours: **white**, **black** and a **surprise colour**. The surprise colour will be selected by picking a crayon out of a bag. It is important to note that you are NOT restricted to three fabrics, but rather to just these three colours.

I will have the crayon bag ready at October and November meetings. After you pull out a crayon, you will be able to create a colour swatch on a piece of paper to take with you. I will record your entry number with the actual crayon. Please make a note of your number. As it is a "contest", I won't be recording names.

Finished quilt entries are to be presented at the May Guild meeting. Each entry will reference their entry number and the crayon will be displayed with the quilt.

President's Challenge 2022-2023

Last year's Challenge was to create a quilted piece with the theme of "Sapphire" in honour of our guild's 45th anniversary. There were several unique entries, ranging from quilts to art pieces, each reflecting an original interpretation of the challenge. The winning entry from **Katherine Hunter** was an accordion display illustrating a variety of quilt blocks, all in beautiful shades of blue.

Block of the Month

Sheila Keating, Cheryl Griffin and Barbara Laycock

NOVEMBER - Quick Christmas Puzzle Block (8 1/2" block)



Cut 4 - 2 1/2" x 4 1/2" rectangles of Christmas print 4 - 2 1/2" x 4 1/2" rectangles of white or white

Sew Set A - 1 print rectangle and 1 white rectangle together joining the short ends. Repeat with another print and the white.

Sew Set B - 1 print rectangle and 1 white rectangle together joining the long sides. Repeat with remaining rectangles.

Join these two groups together, alternating colours to form a ladder.

Press all seams to the darker fabric.

Join Set A to the opposite long sides of Set B, matching the colours of the Christmas fabric on the ends of Set B with the colours of Set A.
