## President's Challenge 2018-2019

**It's a UFO Challenge!** The main goal of the challenge will be to finish 4 UFOs while having some fun at the same time. As an added bonus, there will be a draw for sewing/quilting prizes in June.

To keep it fun, I will ask you to list up to 8 UFOs ... which means you won't know for sure which 4 projects you'll be asked to finish over the next guild year!

**Here's how it works:** Challenge forms will be available at the **September** meeting or online at the Guild website. The forms will include instructions, a project list sheet and 4 blank draw tickets which should be filled in and handed in as you share each completed UFO.

- Participants will identify and list up to 8 UFOs, then hand it in. It is suggested you keep a copy.
- Every two months a number from 1-8 will be drawn. The number drawn will be the UFO project for you to work on over the following two months.
- Completed UFOs and filled in draw tickets are to be brought to the general meetings by the month they are due. They will be presented at that month's Sew and Share.
- Each UFO will have two months to be completed to be eligible to be in the June prize draws.

Since this is for fun, the only criteria for eligible UFOs are as follows:

- 1) they need to have been started already and
- 2) they require 1 hour or more of your time to complete. New projects or projects that need less of 1 hour of your time to complete are ineligible.

SO four completed UFOs means 4 chances to win!

Complete information for this UFO Challenge will be on the website as well as made available to guild members at the September meeting.




### Comfort Quilts

Thank you to Estelle, Anne, Karen and Susan who have done an amazing job over the last two years. The Comfort Quilts team distributed **306** quilts last year alone! With my daughter, Sylvia, as co-chair, and the help of my table-mates, we are hoping to keep up the good work.

When Estelle dropped off the fabric this summer, her mini-van was full! It was all beautifully organized and is such a treat to pick out the fabrics for the kits. It's almost like you are shopping at a quilt shop!

Our theme this year is **Quilts without Borders**, and we will provide quick, easy kits for these quilts. Our first kit uses 5" squares so if you have 5" squares to donate, please bring them to September's meeting. We are also looking for 2 1/2" WOF strips for future kits. (*Editor: WOF is "width of fabric" — lol I had to look this up on the Internet!*) We will also bring in kits that don't have a pattern for anyone who wants to make a quilt using their own favourite design.



The most important step is distributing the finished quilts. Please let us know who might be comforted by receiving one of our quilts. See you in September!


### Quilts of Valour



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
## Library

Please bring the completed blocks given out last June to September's meeting. You will receive a ticket for each block you bring and we will draw the winning ticket that night! You could be the next winner!


Each month there will be a package with a pattern for a quilt block along with some of the fabric you will use to complete the block. The cost is \$1.00 for the package.

Here are the instructions for the next block to make for October's meeting. Remember to pick up your package with the fabric. And then make a block for yourself each month ... coordinate it in your choice of fabrics and voila ... by June 2019 you'll have twelve blocks to make a quilt!

BLOCK OF THE MONTH  
September 2018



**Endless Possibilities** - 12.5" X 12.5" unfinished  
From the Niagara Heritage Quilters' Guild September 2015 BOM

#### Fabric for the block:

**Light: (A)** Two 3.5" squares (from your stash)


**Medium: (B)** Eight 3.5" squares (from your stash)

**Dark: (C)** Two 3.5" squares; **(D)** Two 3.5" x 6.5" rectangles; **(E)** Two 3.5" x 9.5" rectangles.


**This fabric (C,D,E) is supplied in your BOM kit (4" x WOF).**

1. Cut the strip of dark fabric in the BOM kit into the pieces indicated above - **C,D,E**.


2. Make a four-patch unit by sewing two **A** squares with two **B** squares as shown in the illustration at right.



3. Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of four **B** 3.5" squares. Place one **B** square on **D** (3.5" x 6.5"), right sides together, checking orientation, as shown below. Stitch on the drawn line, trim leaving a 1/4" allowance. Press. Repeat with a second set of **B** and **D** pieces.



4. Using the same technique used in Step 3 and using **B** and **E** pieces this time, make 2 units as shown below.



5. Sew a **B** 3.5" square to the end of the unit made in Step 4. Repeat with the second unit.



6. Sew the units made above to the centre 4-patch being careful of the orientation.



7. Sew the units made in step 4 to the top and bottom, again checking orientation.

Refer to the photo on the top right of this page to see the assembled block.

## The “Stitches Through Time” School Project

Preparations for this year’s School Project have begun, and, as always, we are busy tweaking and revamping parts of the programme.

Two years ago we worked with 900+ children to create 40 class quilts that were the Special Exhibit at our 2017 Quilt Show. Last year we scaled back substantially and worked with 3 classes in 3 different schools. The students learned the safe operation of a sewing machine, listened to a presentation, and then worked diligently on several projects. They made coasters to take home, sewed a block for a quilt (or two!), and made 7 large quilts for the families and first responders in the Humboldt tragedy. One class of students also made 23 placemats which were donated to the Oakville Meals on Wheels clients.

This year we will mainly work in Florence Meares P.S. (Burlington), bringing as many classes as possible on board. We have worked with the teacher, Tricia Blain, for two years now and have always been delighted with the enthusiasm the Grade 7s have shown for the project. Other teachers and students expressed a desire to join .. and 14 classes have already signed on!



In addition to volunteers from our membership, we are requesting parent and staff volunteers from the school community. The end goal is to work with the art teacher to create a special exhibit as part of the school’s Art Festival. Working in one school with a permanent place to keep our equipment and supplies will negate the need to haul the machines and supplies from one location to another for each half- or full day at different schools.

Please consider if you think that being a part of this project speaks to you. More information will be available at our monthly guild meetings and in future issues of Snippets.

When we presented the students with their finished class quilt, they presented us with a laminated book of their drawings and comments, which will be shared in the next few issues of Snippets.

When I heard we would be quilting, I thought it would be boring and I wouldn't like it. Learning the history made me think that quilts were important. I liked the sewing part - I didn't have to do work.

*When I heard we would do this, I was pretty excited because my mom had shown me sewing, and I was sewing dog toys at the same time.*

*I thought it was going to be very hard because I had never quilted before and I was a little excited because I wanted to try something new. I want to do this next year because I had fun.*


Learning how to use the sewing machine was a lot of fun. I hope we get to do this again.

*This was actually pretty satisfying.*

To be honest when you first mentioned that every Friday we were going to quilt, I was disappointed. Fridays are my favourite day of the week and finding out that we had to do quilting (which I am not going to lie about – I thought it was just an elder activity) was upsetting. (*Editor: Everybody smiling?*)

Now I can say that these feelings have completely changed. When Mrs. Hunter gave that introductory presentation, I was confused. I thought quilts were simply blankets, but it turned out that they were used to communicate in the slave days and could tell stories and there were some interesting stories.

My quilting experience was quite enjoyable. Something that I thought was going to bore me to death actually turned around to be fun. This fun experience will definitely have me remember that I got to help families that were affected by the Humboldt Broncos devastation.
